## 46 Years to the Day

1979: Scotland Votes on  
Devolution



On 1 March 1979, Scotland held a big vote on devolution. People were asked if they wanted their own Scottish Assembly, which would handle some local powers. The campaign was heated. Some said Scotland deserved to govern itself more, others worried about breaking ties with Westminster. Many Scots felt proud of their identity and hoped this vote might give them more control.

Radio and TV stations discussed the referendum all day, talking about Scottish history and what the future might hold. By the evening, the counting centres were busy. Reports came in slowly. A majority did vote “Yes,” but a special rule called the “40% threshold” meant not enough people had voted, so the result could not take effect. Many felt disappointed, saying this rule was unfair.

Even though it did not pass, the vote left a mark on Scotland’s political landscape. It opened bigger conversations about what it means to be Scottish within the UK. About twenty years later, Scotland got another chance and formed its own Parliament. But 1 March 1979 is remembered as the day Scotland nearly took a big step towards self-government, setting the stage for changes yet to come.

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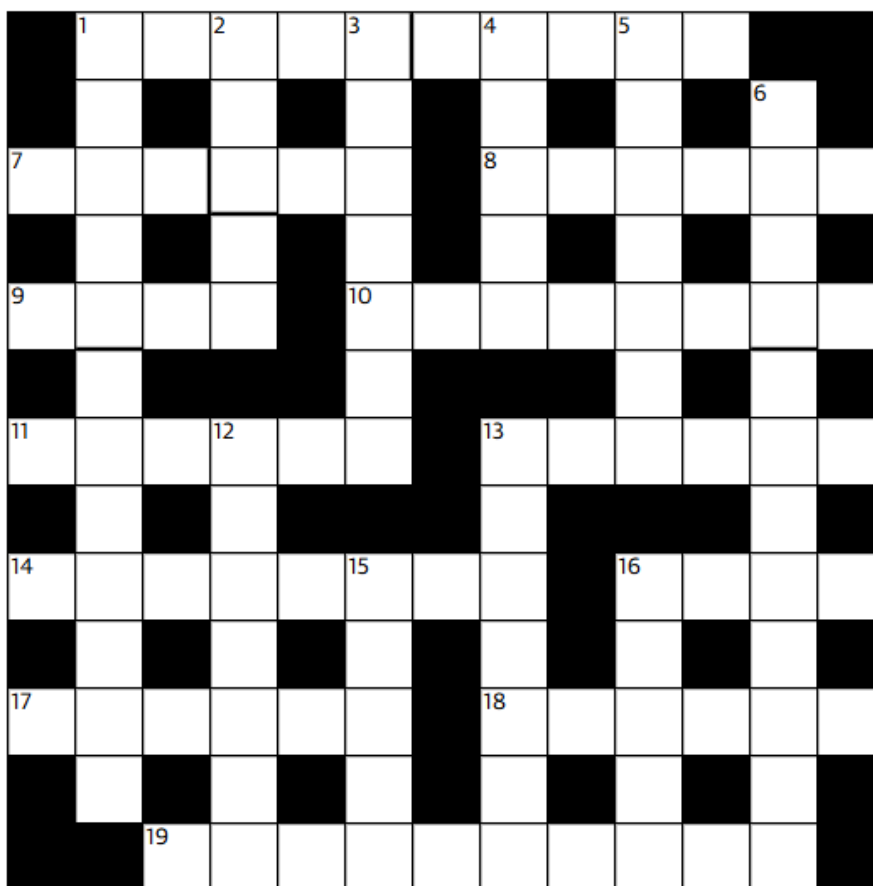

Group Questions:
